NOTICE TO CONTRIBUTORS

Manuscripts are accepted for publication with the understanding that their contents, or their essential substance, have not been published elsewhere and will not be published elsewhere, except in abstract form or by the express consent of Editorial Board. Exceptions are materials in review articles and other special sections. Materials taken from other sources must be accompanied by written permission for reproduction, obtained from the original publisher. Authors are required to have observed standard ethical codes in the execution of the work to be published.

Manuscripts should be typewritten, double-spaced (including literature cited, legends, and tables), in clear concise English and submitted in triplicate (preferably registered mail) together with three copies of figures and tables. The spelling should follow that given in the Oxford

English Dictionary.

Manuscripts should principally consist of title page, abstract, introduction, materials and methods, results, discussion, acknowledgements and literature cited. Statistical methods used should be identified. Priority claims are discouraged. Acknowledgements of aid or criticism should be approved by the person whose help is being recognised.

All published articles and editorials are the responsibility of the author(s) and not that of

the publisher.

The title page should include a short, specific and clear title; full name, degrees, and affiliations of all authors; the name and address of the author to whom reprint requests should be addressed. A covering letter should include the address and telephone number of the person

responsible for negotiations concerning the manuscript.

Figures should be professionally drawn and photographed. Glossy, black and white photographs are requested. Lines should be examined for evenness, breaks and proper alignment. Lettering and symbols should be clear and of even density throughout. Symbols, lettering, and numbering should be of such proportional size that when the figure is reduced to Journal column width, each item will still be distinctly recognizable.

Original artwork or black-and-white negatives should not be sent. Each figure should have a label pasted on its back indicating the figure's number, the name of the authors, and the top of the figure. Do not mount the figure on cardboard. Neither write on the backs-of figure's, nor expose them to paper clips. Photomicrographs should be cropped to 8-cm width, and election photomicrographs should have internal scale markers dimensions.

If photographs of individuals are used, either the subjects should not be identifiable, or

their pictures must be accompanied by written permission to use the figure.

Symbols or arrows used in the figure should be professionally drawn or put on with prestape and should be clearly identified and explained in the legend. Symbols, abbreviations and spellings should be consistent with text.

Legends for illustrations should be typewritten (double spaced) on a separate sheet with

numbers corresponding to the figures.

Abstract in English of not more than 200 words should be included at the beginning of the paper. The abstract should be factual not descriptive. It should be self-contained and understandable without reference to the text. Specific data may be included.

Use standard abbreviations and units. SI units are recommended. Non-standard abbreviations should be defined the first time they appear in the text.

References should be cited in the text as follows:

Emejuaiwe (1981). References having three or more names may be cited as Osoba et al. (1975) References may also be cited thus:

(Green & Smith 1946; Jones et al. (1956).

A series of references should be given in date order.

Different publications having the same author(s) and year should be distinguished by a, b, etc. immediately following the date within parenthesis. This also applies to the same references when listed in the "Literature cited" The Literature list should be typed double-spaced and in alphabetical order should be listed as follows:

Single names first, in alphabetical and date order — Brown 1973; Brown 1974 etc. Multiple names then follow thus: Nnochiri Lantum 1965; Brown & Smith 1971, in date order.

Where two references bear the same date, eg Brown & Green 1970, Brown and Johnson 1970, they should appear in alphabetical order. Names with the prefixes de, do, van, von, etc. should be placed in alphabetical order of the first letter of the prefix e.g. Von Brown would appear under "v" hot "B"

ANNOUNCEMENTS

INSTRUCTIONS TO AUTHORS AND NOTES ON EDITORIAL POLICIES

Please note that I have revised the "NOTICE TO CONTRIBUTORS" which appeared on pages v - vii of vol. 2 No 1 of Nigerian Journal of Microbiology along the lines suggested by several members of the Editorial Board. One major important change is that henceforth, citations in the text should not be made by the use of numbers and "Literature cited" should be in alphabetical order and should not be numbered. I expect three copies of each manuscript and associated figures, tables etc. to be submitted for consideration of publication. One copy must be a clean ribbon copy on good quality paper. I will not accept xerox copies or photocopies of figures, graphs etc. for review purposes. Reviewers evaluate figures as well as manuscripts. Glossy prints of illustrative materials for review should be on 20.6 x 25 cm paper or mounted 20.6 x 25 cm sheets. Authors must keep some copies of their manuscripts in case of lcss. The instructions published in this issue, supercede the ones in the past issues.

Some modifications have been made in the style for preparing manuscripts. Reviewers and Authors should please take note that I am expecting all reviews to be completed within two weeks of receipt of the manuscript by a reviewer. Hopefully this will speed up the process of publication.

Continued improvement of the journal is a chore which requires the cooperation and input of all members of the Society as well as authors, reviewers, Editorial Board members and the printer. Suggestions for the journal's improvement will, therefore, always be appreciated.

I wish to express here my sincere thanks to the past Editor, Professor Stephen O. Emejuaiwe, for his cherished cooperation, that insured a smooth transition of the Editorship. To those authors who may have experienced any delay in the processing of their manuscripts during the transition period we extend our due apologies. All things being equal, it is the firm resolve of the Editorial Board to speed up the publication of subsequent issues.
